

The Delphi Opera House has had a significant economic impact on the City of Delphi and the surrounding area from its opening in September 2015 to now in November 2020. The Opera House with its 30,000 attendees has revitalized the downtown, providing a popular venue for arts, entertainment, weddings, reunions, historical, and cultural events.

About the Delphi Opera House

The 1865 Assion-Ruffing City Hall was named for its third-floor auditorium which opened in June 1865 with a ball for soldiers returning home from the Civil War. The grand hall was converted in 1882 to the Lathrope & Ruffing Opera House, soon known more simply as the Delphi Opera House. Many notables performed on its stage including

soprano Marie Litta, Hoosier poet James Whitcomb Riley, Hi Henry's Minstrels, among others. The 121-member strong Delphi Dramatic Club offered monthly productions. Following a theater fire in Lafayette in 1914, the Delphi Opera House was closed by the fire marshal for having only one exit. As the decades passed the theater became a storage room for shipping crates, store displays, and discarded merchandise. Its fine wallpapers faded and tore; leaks in the roof dissolved plaster medallions; pigeons roosted on the



balcony railing.

The Delphi Preservation Society purchased two-thirds of the City Hall in 1996, acquiring the remaining third in 2007. During its first fifteen years of ownership, the allvolunteer Society listed the building in the National Register, completed a feasibility study, commissioned a structural analysis, a decorative arts analysis, and architectural schematic design work.

Three National Park Service Historic Preservation Fund grants administered through the Indiana Department of Natural Resources Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology helped fund the stabilization of the main roof truss (2000), restoration of the building's facade (2007), and replacement of its roof (2011).

In 2012 the City of Delphi was selected as an Indiana Stellar Community. The Delphi Opera House was the centerpiece of the projects included in the City's Stellar application. The official groundbreaking was August 20, 2014 for the \$4.375 million project that doubled the size of the historic structure with a threestory addition to the rear. Stellar grants from the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs and the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority provided \$2.675 million with the Delphi Preservation Society pledging to raise the remaining \$1.7 million. A loan from the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority enabled the Society to push forward with the restoration while launching an ongoing capital campaign to achieve its project share.

The Delphi Opera House reopened as a performing arts venue and community center in September 2015—just 13 months after the start of construction! The grand reopening recreated the Civil War ball that was the first event in the building. Now fully accessible, the facility is operated by Delphi Opera House, Inc. which develops, implements, and manages programming for the venue. The Delphi Opera House is a cultural landmark for Delphi and Carroll County, with a significant economic impact on the local community.

Economic Impact

More than \$3 Million in first 5 years of operation!

Impact of Visitor Spending

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31,466 visitors attended ticketed events at the Delphi Opera House between October 2015 and March 2020, spending an average of \$50 per event for tickets, food and beverages at local restaurants, and concessions at the Opera House. This totals **\$1,573,300** of economic impact for the local community resulting from Opera House events.

Additionally, 60 special events, including wedding receptions, banquets, reunions, and parties were held at the Opera House during this period. In addition to the rental income to the Opera House of \$65,407, these events created \$504,000 in revenue for local caterers, florists, event coordinators, rental companies, DJs and musicians, sound technicians, and photographers. This totals **\$569,407** of economic impact for the local community and surrounding area from special events.



Impact of Opera House Expenses

Over these five years, the Delphi Opera House paid:

- \$313,680 to performing artists;
- \$190,187 to personnel;
- \$114,791 for contract services;
- \$68,248 to local businesses to cover expenses such as concessions, advertising, and printing

And, the Delphi Preservation Society paid:

- \$131,653 for utilities (including \$7,710 to the City of Delphi);
- \$57,662 for insurance;
- \$64,250 to local contractors for painting, repairs, and maintenance.

This totals **\$940,471** of economic impact from operating expenses paid by the Delphi Opera House and Delphi Preservation Society.
